

Prof. Dr. Christoph Burchard LL.M. (NYU) holds the Chair of Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure, International and European Criminal Law, Comparative Law, and Legal Theory at Goethe University. Since April 2023, he has been the founding spokesperson for the Center for Critical Computational Studies (C3S) at Goethe University, which conducts research on the interactions between digitality and democracy and the dynamics of change. He is also Principal

Investigator at the Research Center for Normative Orders, where he headed the research field “Digitalization and Artificial Intelligence,” among others. From 2019 to 2023, he was a Goethe Fellow at the Forschungskolleg Humanwissenschaften with the project “The Normative Order of Artificial Intelligence.”


Finn-Lauritz Schmidt works as a research assistant (*Wissenschaftlicher Mitarbeiter*) at the Chair of Criminal Law and Criminal Procedure, International and European Criminal Law, Comparative Law, and Legal Theory at Goethe University. He is an Early Career Researcher at the Research Centre Normative Orders as well as a lecturer at Goethe University (Faculty of Law) and the Albstadt-Sigmaringen University (Open C³S certificate programme). In

2024, he was a visiting scholar at the Max Planck Institute for the Study of Crime, Security and Law in Freiburg. His research interests lie in the foundations, transformations and crises of Criminal Law in the ecological polycrisis; the title of his doctoral project is ‘Criminal Law in the Anthropocene – Studies on the Constellation of Actors, Time, and Space’.

Giuseppe Di Vetta is Assistant Professor of Criminal Law at the Sant'Anna School of Advanced Studies, where he obtained his PhD in Law. He is the Scientific Director of the Jean Monnet Module [AENEAS](#) — European Due Diligence Law in Global Value Chains at Sant'Anna School. He was a postdoctoral fellow for five years. He has been a Visiting Research Fellow at the École normale supérieure (ENS, Paris) and at the Global Scholars Academy of IGLP — Harvard Law School. He published the monograph “La responsabilità da reato degli enti nella dimensione transnazionale” (Giappichelli, 2023) and

numerous other scholarly contributions on criminal law theory, transnational corporate criminal liability, organized crime, and tax crime. He has participated in and contributed to national and international research projects. "Criminal Law in the Anthropocene" constitutes a particularly well-aligned component of his broader research agenda, which encompasses the exploration of varied conceptions of 'the transnational' in criminal law amid globalization; the study of the relationship between spatiality and criminal law; corporate liability for human-rights violations and other transnational wrongdoings; and transformations of punitive paradigms as governance shifts from regulatory to post-regulatory forms, within which he advances the conceptual framework of criminal law governmentality (CLG).

Bijan Fateh-Moghadam (Dr. iur.) is Professor of Fundamentals of Law and Life Sciences Law at the University of Basel. His research focuses on the fundamentals of criminal law in relation to (bio)medicine, new technologies and climate change. As a legal sociologist, he is interested in how global social transformation dynamics, such as genome editing (CRISPR), artificial intelligence and the Anthropocene, are observed and processed by law (law & society; transformation research). Another focus of his research is investigating the role of criminal law in integrating pluralistic societies.



Dr. Alice Savarino is Research Fellow (*Wissenschaftliche Mitarbeiterin*) in Criminal Law at the University of Basel, working at the Chair of Prof. Dr. iur. Christopher Geth. She has held visiting positions and research fellowship abroad, including at Max Planck Institute for the Study of Crime, Security and Law in Freiburg i. Br. The main areas of research interest encompass theory of crime, risk regulation, corporate criminal liability, environmental and

occupational safety crime. She is involved in international and interdisciplinary projects on Criminal Law and the Anthropocene, with a focus on temporality, climate protection, and criminal liability. She recently published her first monograph “*Danni lungo-latenti e responsabilità penale. Modelli di imputazione e prospettive politico-criminali*” (Giappichelli 2025), and obtained the Italian National Scientific Habilitation as Associate Professor of Criminal Law.
